The goal of 100 subscriptions to the proposed Book of Appendices at \$10.00 each or the guarantee of \$1,000 toward its publication, will, it now appears, be reached. Seventy subscriptions, totalling \$700.00, have been received, and to this a member of the Society who is deeply interested in the publication of the Book,

The manuscript will be submitted at the Westcott dinner in New York Jan. 14th, and the final decision as to whether the Appendices can be published or not. Two to three months will be required to print and bind the Book, so the final payment will not be required until around May 1st.

PASSING OF CHAPLAIN

In the passing Sept. 24, 1938, of Chaplain Myron Nelson Wes-WESCOTT cott, this Society loses one of its most earnest and devoted members. Yo Scribe first met Dr. Wescott in 1933 at his home in the Providence section of Scranton, Pa., where he was then pastor of the Baptist Church. When this Society was organized, he became one of its charter members. He was elected its Chaplain for 1935-6-7 and re-elected for 1937-8-9. In July, 1937, he became pastor of the Baptist Church at historic old Half Moon, Saratoga County, N.Y. Although his health began to fail last Spring, he carried on his church work throughout the Summer, even serving communion two weeks before his death. His condition became so grave Thursday, Sept. 22, that it was necessary he go to the Hospital at

Albany, N. Y., where he was attended by Dr. Gorham, chief of staff. He grew rapidly worse Saturday merning and passed away at 1:05 P. M. Dr. Wescott was born in Englewood, N. J., July 28, 1875. On June 6, 1900, he was married to Miss Gertrude Merchant of Cranfield, England. Two children, Frederic M. and Harriet, blessed this union. He is survived by Mrs. Wescott, the two children, two grandchildren, and his brothers Alvin D., Walter V., Frank I., Charles A. and Chester A. Wescott, four nephews and two nieces, nearly all of whom are members of this Society. The deepest sympathy of the Society is extended to Mrs. Wescott and the family.

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We also regretfully announce the death Nov. 4th at his home in Springfield, Erie County, N. Y., of our member, Judge Willis G. Clark. He was born Nov. 10, 1854. His wife died in 1902. He is survived by three sons and four daughters to whom the sympathy of our members is extended.

I., to Hagerstown, Md., to take charge of several gas-plants in that vicinity. Roger, our next son (also our member), is to be married Nov. 11th to Miss Ethel Carlson and will reside here in Pawtucket. David, our youngest (and he also is a member), is in business with a photo-engraving plant in Waltham, Mass. He comes home week-ends; this leaves us quite alone again. The mother of Mrs. Niles Westcott passed away a few weeks ago in her 91st year."

PLANNING THE 1939 Members of the general committee of arrangements for the third biennial Westcott Commemorative Celebration June 22, 23 and 24,1939 CELEBRATION . at Bronxville, N. Y., gathered November 5th at the home of Miss Ruth M. Havey, 25 Fifth Avenue, New York City, and organized for the job ahead. Harry J Westcott of Passaic, N. J., chairman of the committee, presided. Those present were: Mrs. John T. Wildes, Mrs. Adelbert Niles Potter, the Misses Florence Earll Clarke, Ruth M. Havey and Florence A. Westcott, Dr. F. Howard Westcott. Other members who were absent, are Mrs. Chester W. DoMond, Mrs. Willard H. Frost and Messrs. Chester A. Westcott and Carleton J. Westcoat. National President Joseph R. Westcott of Binghamton, who happened to be in New York, was also present, as was Ye Scribe of The Family Quarterly, and his wife. Program, room accommodations and entertainment were discussed for two hours and the duties of the several sub-committees outlined. Of these sub-committees Dr. F. Howard Westcott is chairman of the committee on speakers; Mrs. John T. Wildes of vocal and instrumental music; Miss Florence A. Westcott of registration and room accommodations; Miss Ruth M. Havey of publicity and printing; Mrs. Chester W. DeMond of church and commemorative services, and Mrs. Willard H. Frost of tables and decorations. Chairmen will appoint others to their respective committees. The general committee will meet again January 14th.

The Celebration will begin Thursday evening, June 22, with a dinner at the Gramatan Inn. which hotel will be Westcott headquarters throughout the event. Previous to this dinner, there will be a social period and time for each visitor to register and get settled. Thus, this will enable those who plan to spend the week in New York to attend the World Fair the first four days of the week and arrive in Bronxville between 4 and 5 P. M. on the fourth day, Thursday. Friday morning --Commemorative Services; afternoon-entertainment; evening-dinner. Saturday morning -- third biennial business meeting and election of officers; afternoon--possibly a visit to nearby Rye Beach on the Sound; evening -- dinner and installation of new officers. The price of each of three dinners, all of which will be at Gramatan Inn, will be \$1.75. This includes all gratuities. Visitors, of course, may attend all or any part of the three-day program, but the committee requests dinner reservations in advance and that each visitor register first upon arrival. To help facilitate planning for the enjoyment of all during the Celebration, a blank will accompany the March issue of The Family Quarterly and those intending to be present will be requested to fill it out and mail. While the Celebration is sponsored by the Society of Stukely Westcott Descendants, all Westcott descendants, whether members of the Society or not, are cordially invited to join in this memorializing of their emigrant family-founder -- and each member should consider himself or herself a committee to extend this invitation!

THE JOY OF FINDING NEW "For years I communed with myself and said, "Isn't it too bad! KINFOLK The name of Westcott will die when you do! What childish innocence! Four years ago I learned that there are over 3,000 Westcott descendants in the United States, and some four or five hundred who bear the name of Westcott. I had to adjust my mind and get it ready to receive such an amazing fact. I laughed at myself -- a good thing to do once in awhile -- and thought, feeling very insignificant -- 'You're just a drop in the bucket. You're just an atom -- an atom -- ' and out of the dim past something seemed to leap at me about atoms and how loyally they stay on their jobs. Where would ANYTHING be if they didn't work in unison? And then I began to see where I fitted into the picture. I was a tiny bit of a big whole -- only one of thousands who make up the great Westcott family. I began to feel important again in a different way. It's a fine thing to 'know your kindred', but it's a wonderful thing to know your ancestors. It's splendid to honor them and be proud of them, but we want them to look down upon us and say, 'We too, are proud of you! So far, we have laid a foundation. Let us build a structure that will commemorate the name of Westcott for ever. The way to do this is to emulate the modest atom, and all stick together.
