The raised border, letters and coat of arms have been carefully hand-tooled and finished in bright golden satin and contrasted pleasingly with the matted brown background. At the time of the alarm in 1777, Salisbury hurriedly formed a company of militia in which the various Westcott adults "signed up", and they marched to the defense of the border.
