YOUR ANCESTORS -- (Epoch III) -- Any authentic, up-to-date map of Devonshire, England will show Wescote or Westacott, as it is modernly spelled on the map, in the parish of Hartland in the present easterly suburbs of ancient Barnstaple on the bay of the same name (G-1). Here in the closing years of the 13th century, St. Leger de Wescote lived in the splendor befitting the family in that period. It is stated on good authority that on the same site where the ancient manor-house stood, now stands a spacious house, the size of which may be visualized from the fact that according to recent information, it contains upward of 350 windows. St. Leger de Wescote was the second of three sons of John de Wescote (See Epoch II) and his wife, a daughter of Sir John St. Leger. The other sons were John and Thomas, John was Warden of John the Baptist Hospital and Canon of St. Peter's, Exeter, succeeding his father in 1307. Thomas was Abbot of the parish of Hartland in 1315. St. Leger de Wescote no doubt derived his Christian name from his mother's paternal family, the St. Legers Legers or Lode reverting in France to the year 678. Little more is known of him other than he was "of the fielde of Wescote" (G-1) in 1300, in which year he married a daughter of a line descending through the titled families of Wadham and Cantelupe (G-4), and had a son William, who flourished at "the Manor of Wescote" (A-2) in 1345-6, with a Danish lady for wife. Of their issue were two sons, Thomas and William, of whom more will be learned in "The Quarterly" for June. Mr. Roelker gave a most interesting and comprehensive talk about the Brown brothers who had built, and formerly owned and lived in this mansion. The members enjoyed looking around the old house and at the many paintings and historical curios. Refreshments were served by Miss Susan W. Handy, assisted by Mrs. Leslie P. Westcott and Mrs. V. NINE-YEAR RECORD OF THE SOCIETY--Our Society is represented by members in 29 States and in Nova Scotia. Since it was organized Jan. 13, 1934, memberships have been issued to 297 descendants, of which one was transferred to associate membership, leaving 296 members and 16 associate members; total 312. This total membership has been reduced (Dec. 31, 1942) to 208 because of loss of 35 members by death of which five memberships have been retained by survivor-consorts, reducing number terminated to 30. Also 74 members have been lost (in the nine years the Society has been organized) by resignations and non-payment of dues, making a total of ex-members of 104 which taken from the total membership of 312, gave on Dec. 31, 1942, a total membership of 208. However, on Jan. 31, 1943, in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Society, nine members had to be dropped because of non-payment of 1942 dues, leaving a total of 199 members. When the 118 husbands or wives (consorts), as the case may be, are added to the 199 descendant-members, a total of 318 persons are found to be affilliated with the Society.--Drawn from the annual report of National Secretary Dorothy Potter (Mrs. Adelbert N.).

IN MEMORIAM--Helen Anderson Hatmaker Klein (A-97), charter member of our Society who was present at the dinner-meeting in New York Jan. 13, 1934, when the Society was organized, died at her home in Pleasantville, N. Y., Jan. 4th, 1943. She made numerous contributions to the Westcott genealogy, and was deeply interested in the family activities. When ill health did not prevent, she was present at the Chapter dinners in New York. The sympathy of the Society is extended to her family, a son, two daughters and eight grandchildren.

NO NATIONAL CELEBRATION IN 1943--The annual meeting of the Directors of our Society, held Jan. 9th, was attended by the following members: President F. Howard Westcott, Historian Rachel C. Wilkins, Registrar Roscoe L. Mhitman, Secretary Dorothy Potter (Mrs. A. N.), and Treasurer Pliny K. Westcott. Reports of the Secretary and Treasurer, showing the finances and membership to be very satisfactory, were received and approved. It was voted to postpone the 5th Biennial Celebration, scheduled for the coming Summer, until conditions of the country warrant holding it; also that the present officers continue until such time as an election can be held.

CENTRAL N. Y. CHAPTER ADDS TO ITS ENDOWMENT FUND--In 1938, this Chapter undertook the future care of the cemetery at Milford Center, N.Y., where the ancestors of its members are buried, by creating an endowment fund. In five years this endowment has been built up to \$1,345, the Chapter having recently added \$25. It is hoped to increase the fund to an even \$1,500 at least, at a not too-distant date.

GREATER N.Y. CHAPTER DINES--The customary anniversary observance of the death (Jan. 12, 1677) of Stukely Westcott, founder of the Westcott family in America, was held by the Greater N.Y. Chapter at the Fifth Avenue Hotel in New York, Saturday evening, Jan. 9th last.
