YOUR ANCESTORS -- (Epoch VI) -- While Guido and Alice Grenville Wescote passed their entire life on the ancestral estate in the parish of Hartland in Devonshire, England, their son, Thomas, removed from the nearly two-century old family manor house late in the 16th century and settled in the parish of Porlock in the adjacent shire of Somerset. Here lived his second cousin, Mary, daughter of Thomas Wescott. Thomas was the son of William Wescott, a younger brother of Sir Thomas deWescote whose wife was the proud heiress of the Littleton family. William Wescott not being heir to the Wescote manor estate, evidently removed to Porlock early in the 15th century at about the time of the death of his father, Guy. He changed the spelling of the family name to We scott, as it is spelled today by many of his descendants. Mary We scott, of Thomas, and Thomas Wescote, of Guido, were married probably late in the 15th century (no record of date has been found), and continued to live in Porlock, Thomas Wescote adopting the spelling of the family name as it was spelled by the family in the parish. Porlock is in southwest Somerset, some thirty miles from the ancient family estate in Devonshire and only a short way from Ilminster where the emigrant Stukely Westcott lived when he was married in 1619. Among the children of Thomas and Mary Wescott were three sons: Philip, Thomas and Stephen. Thomas, the second son, followed the Court in the time of King Henry VIII (1509-1547). His second wife, a sister of his first wife, was Alice Walker, daughter of John and Alice Callacutt Walker. (G-7) He died in 1549 and his wife in 1557. They had two sons, Philip and Edward. Edward flourished in 1541-1551, then being a distinguished barrister of the English orown. From him, the Westcott family in America is believed to descend. In abstracts of "leases" (deed) on file in the London Museum his name is usually spelled Westcote. More of him will be learned in Epoch VII. (THE READER DESIROUS OF KNOWING MORE OF THE FAMILY HISTORY, IS ADVISED TO CONSULT THE WESTCOTT GENEALOGIES OF 1932 and 1939. SUCH CHANGES AS APPEAR IN THESE ACCOUNTS ARE RESULTS OF CONTINUED RESEARCH.)
