POST-WAR "GET-TOGETHERS" OF WESTCOTTS-It was suggested that the Chapters of the National Society get-together last Fall for a renewal of the family spirit which unavoidably became shomewhat dormant through the four years of the war. It seemed advisable to reclaim some of the momentum so enthusiastically attained up to the time war was declared. It is unfortunate that a better report is not possible, but cold weather and loss of old, customary associations were responsible in most instances for postponements. However, the Chicagoland Chapter and the Rhode Island Chapter answered "here" when the roll was called; the Greater New York Chapter had to accept postponement but will have its dinner-meeting on January 12th.

Here are the Chapter reports as gleaned by "The Quarterly" --

Central New York Chapter, No. 1--No report received. However, members Mrs. Grace Davenport Roberts of Cooperstown, a nd Roscoe L. Whitman of Westfield, visited the old cemetery at Milford Center, N. Y., where many Westcott pioneers of that section are buried. The graves were found to be properly cared for, thanks to the \$1,500 endowment fund of the Chapter.

Rhode Island Chapter, No. 2--While no report has been received, the Chapter scheduled a meeting for the Fall season. The report will probably be made in "The Quarterly" for next March.

Greater New York Chapter, No. 3--Announcement of its dinner-meeting to be held in New York on January 12, appears later in this issue.

Northern New York Chapter, No. 4--An executive committee meeting was held Oct. 12th at the home of the Chapter President, Mrs. Lulu Westcott (Burgen) Fowler at Hastings, Oswego County, N. Y. The report states that "while many for one reason or another were unable to attend, we were able to get things back on a family good business basis. RETURNS TO OID. FAMILIAR SCENES -- Through the rolling hills of northern Jersey, crossing the Delaware at Milford, Pa., and thence on through the densely wooded forest to Halsey and Honesdale, Pa., over the mountain to Carbondale (that center of coal-mining), through the fertile farm-lands of the Abingtons in north-eastern Pennsylvania to join the famous Lacawanna Trail at Kingsley and on across the Susquehanna between Halstead and Great Bend, down the Susquehanna to Binghamton, one of the throbbing growing cities of the Empire State, comprised the first day of a motor trip enjoyed in October by Ye Scribe, Mrs. Whitman and her sister, Mrs. Pomercy (Aunt Eva, as she is generally known.). It was the first real "exercise" the 1936 Buick had had since 1941 when war was declared. The evening in Binghamton was delightfully passed with three of the charter members of the National Society--Mrs. Frederick H. Westcott, her daughter, Mrs. Joseph H. Martin and her son Past-National President, Joseph Rogers Westcott; two granddaughters, Mrs. Cook and Mrs. Ramsing being away with their soldier-husbands. * * The second day was up the Chenango for a short way, then over the mountain to Harpursville and the upper Susquehanna valley which stretches all the way to Lake Otsego and Cooperstown; up the winding vale through such pretty little hamlets as Afton, Bainbridge, Sidney, Unadilla and Otego to the bustling town of Oneonta, in which the writer first saw daylight more than three-quarters of a century ago. Our member, Mrs. Minnie Westcott Lunn, at Oneonta, was ill and another member, Reuben H. Westcott was attending a meeting of his Spanish-American war comrades, so the evening was passed quietly in the hotel room. * * The third day was one of interest and enjoyment, stopping first at the cemetery at Milford Center, N. Y., where many of the pioneer Westcotts of that section are buried and their graves cared for for all time by an endowment fund created by the Central N.Y. Chapter; here our member, Mrs. Grace Davenport Roberts of Cooperstown, joined us for an inspection of cemetery which was found to be in good condition; then going on up the Susquehanna Valley past the old Reuben Westcott house erected in 1822, to Milford Village and historical Cooperstown, home of James Fenimore Cooper and the scene of the second National Celebration (1937) of the Westcott Society; through Cooperstown, up the western shore of picturesque Lake Otsego and on following the trail taken by General Clinton and his troops in 1779 from Fort Plain in the Mohawk Valley to join General Sullivan. Old Fort Plain looked just as ancient as ever. Crossing the historical and beautiful Mohawk here to Nelliston and on to old Stone Arabia, the

scene of a Revolutionary battle, the Buick rolled into historical Johnstown with its many reminders of the 18th century, including the oldest Court House still standing (1772). (Johnstown, or Ka-lan-e-ka, as it was called by the Indians in 1750, offers much of interest for a National Westcott Celebration some day.) The fourth and fifth day were passed at Amsterdam with its gigantic rug and carpet manufacturing mills, commuting back and forth from Johnstown where there is a particularly good hotel. At Amsterdam, the birthplace of Mrs. Whitman and her sister, many of their cousins and old friends were visited for the first time in four years. (Mrs. Whitman and Ye Scribe were married there in 1894.) After passing the forenoon of the fifth day in Amsterdam, the afternoon found us traveling past the great General Electric Works and the American Locomotive Works at Schenectady, where the beautiful valley of the Mohawk was left to journey on to Albany, the Capitol of the Empire State. The evening in Albany was passed with the widow of the writer's brother, her two daughters and five grandchildren. The next and last day (the sixth) returned us home through Catskill, old Kingston, Newburgh a nd Tuxedo Park with the realization that a wonderful trip was at an end. While away, the writer visited the graves of two greatgreat- grandparents, four great-grandparents, one grandfather and two grandmothers, his own parents; while Mrs. Whitman visited the graves of her great-grandparents, two grandparents and her own parents.
