A NAME TO REVERE--It can be agreed that Stukely is both a peculiar and an odd Christian name to give to a child. So it would seem today, yet two centuries ago it was common in New England and particularly in Rhode Island as John, James and Joseph. As is so frequent today the name was given for an ancestor. This time for two female ancestors. The mother and grandmother of Stukely Westcott were Damaris Stucley. Stucley was the name of an old, distinguished family in southwest England and so it was natural that the son and grandson should be given the name Stucley or Stukely as the Westcott emigrant spelled it. The name now is practically extinct.

20 YEARS AGO--Notices were issued twenty years ago calling Westcotts together for a reunion to be held in the old Baptist Church at Milford Center, Otsego County, N. Y. The reunion was held in 1931 with 182 Westcotts in attendance. An association was formed with the late Judge James Westcott Lester of Saratoga Springs, N. Y., as President; and the late Harris Lee Cooke of Cooperstown, N. Y., as Vice-President. The association carried on to 1933 when another reunion was held at which time a committee was appointed to call a meeting in New York City in January, 1934, to organize a National Society. This, in brief, was the initial effort to form the national society of Westcotts.

GENEALOGIST'S HEADACHE--A recent Gallup survey shows only 46% of women know the names of their maternal grandmothers and 38% of their paternal grandfathers. This indicates the little interest shown in family histories. Let us as a society learn more of our early people!

THE NAME OF STUKELY WESTCOTT STILL LIVES--In January 1951 in Springfield, Missouri, the Daughters of Colonists organized a new chapter. "Sixteen Springfield women met at the home of Mrs. Frank B. Young, East George St. Road, on January 26, 1951 to greet Miss Emily Stapleton, of Albany, Missouri. Miss Stapleton is the State Regent of the Missouri Society, of Daughters of American Colonists. The purpose of Miss Stapleton's visit to Springfield was to organize the Stukely Westcott Chapter, so named in order to honor the organizing Regent, Mrs. Clarence Montieth, who is an early Descendant of this early Colonial Patriot."

SMALL WORLD--Arthur Westcott Pailthorp, one of our new members, writes the following: "I have this information from one of my brothers whose home is in Washington, D. C. Some time ago he was in Winatchee, Washington on government business and noticed the name Wescott on a window of a plumbing establishment. He visited with this man and found that the man's father came from New York State and that he and his wife were still living, both of them nearly blind. He invited my brother to visit them which he did and found that he was the youngest brother of my grandfather. He showed my brother a Stereotype of our Grandfather which was a copy of one which we had at home."
