ONE OF A KIND ---

(An item of interest sent by our member Mrs. Etta Schumacher, of Ann Arbor, Michigan.)

The John Ward Westcott Company of First Street, Detroit, Michigan, is listed as "Marine Reporters" but that is an uninteresting description of a fascinating enterprise.

## ONE OF A KIND (Continued)

"It all started on a summer day back in 1874 when Captain J. W. Westcott docked the package freighter, the Mineral Rock, at Detroit and went ashore to tend to some banking.

As he trudged up the hill he looked back to see the Mineral Rock swinging at the dock with the entire crew idle while he at-

tended to shore business.

'There should be some way to handle these shore details without tying up a whole ship,' the Captain muttered to himself, as he turned into the bank. 'I know I'D be willing to pay well for such a service.'

By the time he boarded the Mineral Rock again, Captain Westcott had an idea. On the return trip he left the Mineral Rock, got himself a row boat and was in business.

Captain Westcott's business outgrew his rowboats and his

single-handed efforts.

Last year the J. W. Westcott and the J. W. Westcott II, a couple of sturdy and powerful crafts and the only floating Post Offices in the United States, met 20,899 vessels in the Detroit

River, an average of 76 a day or one every 19 minutes.

Of course the Captain himself (Mrs. Schumacher's father) was not around to see all that. He died in 1913. His son J. W. Westcott came into the firm in 1902, now a third J. W. Westcott, the Captain's grandson, is in the business and there's a fourth J. W. Westcott, the Captain's six year old great-grandson coming along." Refer to National Geographic Magazine, Dec. 1950

LETTER FROM COUSIN FLORENCE WARNER, of Oakland, California "Dear Cousin, I certainly enjoy the Quarterly, read them and re-read them - would so love to meet with all of the cousins and know them better.

I lived in Malone, Franklin County, New York until I was 12 years old then my father, Ira L. Wescott, Jr. moved to Minnesota in 1880, town of Rock Creek, Pine County. Father's sister, Marinda Wescott Ricketson had moved there and father and his brother George Wescott, Nettie Westcott Emory's father, came to live in the new land of tall trees and wild land. A small saw mill and

store was about all there was to Rock Creek at that time. When I was  $17\frac{1}{2}$  years old, I married James Joseph Warner and we lived in St. Paul, Minnesota where all of my children were born. In March 1906, just before the earthquake, we came to San Francisco, California and in 1911 bought our home at 721 - 45th Street, Oakland, where I am living at the present time. On August 25, I will be 86 years old. All of my family except one son, James Lewis Warner, have passed away.

I hear-from Cousin Nettie at Christmas time. These last few years Nettie and her husband met my grandson, Commander J.

Byron Warner of United States Navy at their home in East Cleveland, Ohio. Commander Warner is now stationed at The Navy Base at Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay.

Well, Dear Cousin, I did not think I would write so much but after I got started I did not seem to come to the right place to close, so will say good-night.

HALFMOON CHURCH TO BE RAZED --- Troy Record, November 28, 1953

"The old wooden First Baptist Church in Halfmoon, New York will be razed by the first of next year. The church is 162 years old. The property on which the church is located has been purchased by the widow of a former Baptist Minister, the Reverend Myron N. Wescott, at one time minister of the church. Mrs. Wescott will live in the parsonage located on the property.

The church was moved to its present location from Newtown in 1834. It has not been in service for the past few years. The building is made of wide boards and hand hewn timber. The loft beams are secured by wooden pegs. The bell that hung in the belfry was manufactured in West Troy, now Watervliet."

(Note - Reverend Myron Wescott was Chaplain in the early years of the Society)

EARLY WESTCOTT HISTORY (Continued from December 1953 Quarterly)

"About the middle of the 17th Century we find among the earliest colonists, to the western world, Richard and Stukely Westcote (sometimes spelled Wescote). Stukely with his friend Roger Williams, settled in Rhode Island at Providence 1636. Richard went to Connecticut and was one of the first settlers of Wethersfield in 1639. His residence and town lot of three acres are shown on the map of Wethersfield, and the records attest that he took an active part in public affairs. His son John, with others founded Westchester, New York, and Daniel the direct ancestor of the New Jersey Westcotts represented his constituents in the General Court of Hartford at three different times. All through the "History of Stamford" in Colonial Times, we find the name of Daniel Westcote in the Administration of Public Affairs. A military spirit seems to have been a family inheritance for one hundred years before the Revolution. In 1676 this Daniel Westcote was voted "town lands" by local

In 1676 this Daniel Westcote was voted "town lands" by local authorities for services rendered against the common enemy (Presumably the Indians), when he responded to the public call for such services. An enterprising spirit for colonization was abroad

in those days, and as the climate of New England was rigorous in winter, the soil not fertile, it is not surprising that many of the early emigrants, locating first in New England, changed their residence to more southern colonies."

Dewey honored Mrs. Harlow Hamlin Stafford of 84 Hillside Avenue, yesterday with messages of congratulations and best wishes on her 100th birthday.

Mayor Stanley W. Church and Miss Gertrude S. Carraway President General of the National Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, were among the countless other relatives and friends who extended greetings.

Born Mary Ellen Page McLean, daughter of Hector McLean and Mary Bolton Page of New York City, she is a great-great grand-mother and a resident of New Rochelle for almost a half century. She has ancestors who fought in the American Revolution and is the widow of a Civil War Veteran, Harlow Hamlin Stafford. She is also the mother of a Spanish-American War Veteran and the grandmother and great grandmother of veterans of the first and second World Wars.

Among her forebears who fought for the English Colonies in the French and Indian Wars was the noted English Scout against the Indians, Captain Benjamin Wright, whose diary is preserved in the museum at Greenfield, Massachusetts. Rebecca Towne Nurse, 'the Salem Witchcraft martyr', another of her colonial ancestors, is one of the memorable characters in Arthur Miller's drama, 'The Crucible'. Mrs. Stafford also has ancestors who were founders of the Massachusetts Bay Colony and the Pioneer Valley of the Connecticut River."

Her granddaughter, Mrs. Dorothy Stafford (Morey) Kershaw, who, along with her husband, Richard Kershaw are members of our Westcott Society. All of us are very happy to have Mrs. Stafford or "Gram", to all who know her, join our Society. So, Dear Cousins, remember on May 31, 1954, Mrs. Stafford will be 101 years young!
