THE ROAD TO SUCCESS --- by Philip Hampson of the Chicago Daily Tribune dated April 17, 1954.

Title - "A Sketch of Miss Minita Westcott, Head of Storms & Westcott," (Part of which is printed here):

"If Miss Minita Westcott had accepted her aunts invitation to spend a year just doing 'nothing' in her former home town of Binghamton, New York, she might have----well, who knows what she might have been doing? The chances are she would not be following her present interesting career.

Miss Westcott a few years after World War I made a compact with her aunt that if she did not get a job in Chicago at the end of a week she would go to the Aunt's home in Binghamton. However a neat little 'ad.' appeared in a daily paper (Chicago Tribune) which offered employment to a smart stenographer.

Miss Westcott hastened to the office of Mr. North Storms in the Harris Trust and Savings Bank Building and before she left it she was on the payroll of Mr. Storms, who owned a Trade Association Management firm. In a few years she became Mr. Storm's Secretary, later a partner in the firm of Storms & Westcott, and since Mr. Storms death in July of 1951, has been the owner of the firm, which has its headquarters in Tribune Towe.

She is known as Miss Westcott but actually she has been happily married since 1921 to George Waters Trainor, a salesman of heavy chemicals.

Miss Westcott has fifteen employees, including three men, one of whom is her son, Westcott Trainor. Trade Association work requires many speeches and much travel. Miss Westcott estimates that she spends about five months a year out of the city on conventions and other matters relating to the association she serves."

EARLY WESTCOTT HISTORY --- Continued from March 1954 Quarterly)

"Daniel Westcote sold out his property in Fairfield Township, which included Stamford in 1694, and with others moved to New Jersey. This Connecticut Colony called their home in New Jersey "Fairfield", after the older settlement in New England, and still older home in England. Daniel Westcote died in 1702. His will is

recorded at Trenton, March 28, 1704, leaving three sons, Samuel, Daniel and Ebenezer, who were among the founders of settlements in Salem County; also in Cumberland County, New Jersey, after it was set off from Salem, and their record was an enviable one. In the founding of the First Presbyterian Church in Fairfield, many Westcotes were incorporators and chief supporters, their names occuring very frequently in the lists of elders, deacons and ministers. In the very earliest accounts, in Old England before the Reformation, we find them filling high positions in the Church of England. In civil life, they can be traced like "Richard of Weathersfield" and "Daniel of Stamford", all through the public archives in their lives of usefulness and honor in their States."
