LETTER FROM COUSIN BLANCHE HOWARD SCOTT --- Cranston, Rhode Island

Dr. Niles Westcott, 76, of Oaklawn, Rhode Island, assistant superintendent at Butler Hospital for 27 years before his retirement in 1954, died May 31, 1957 at the Whitehall Nursing Home in Warwick, Rhode Island. As many of us knew, he had been in poor health for several years. "At Butler Hospital", Dr. Ruggles said, "Medical care reached an enviably high level, largely through Dr. Westcott's vast knowledge of medical literature, his ability to

apply this knowledge wisely, his faculty of careful observation of the patient and his insistence upon good medical and nursing care and accurate records."

A native Rhode Islander, Dr. Westcott was the son of the late Christopher Niles Westcott and Abby M. (Spencer) Westcott. He was born April 25, 1881 and lived all his life on the family homestead at 680 Oaklawn Avenue, Oaklawn, Rhode Island. He was married in 1912 to Clara W. Harry, his only survivor.

He was a graduate of Brown University 1905 and was elected to Sigma XI, National Scientific Honorary Society. In 1909 he was graduated Cum Laude from Medical School at Yale University.

Dr. Westcott was a member of the Providence Medical Association, the Rhode Island Medical Society, the American Medical Association and was a Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and also the Rhode Island Association of Psychiatry and Neurology. He was a member of the Rhode Island Yale Alumni Association,

He was a member of the Rhode Island Yale Alumni Association, the Rhode Island Historical Society and the Westcott National Family Society. He was a member of the Community Baptist Church of Oaklawn and of What Cheer Lodge, F. & A. M.

He was noted in his profession as being one of the first in his country to diagnose agranulocytosis, a blood ailment, and was among the first to make a diagnosis of undulant fever. He also made a diagnosis of Pick's Disease of the brain, rarely made on a living patient.

Dr. Westcott was buried in the family plot on the property at Cranston, Rhode Island.

All of the Westcott Cousins will miss Dr. Niles Westcott. He was an enthusiastic member of our Westcott Society. Many of us met him at our Cooperstown, New York gathering in 1952 and also many of us were entertained on his Oaklawn lawn at the 1935 and 1954 gathering in Rhode Island.
