Westcott died in Rochester on December 3, 1954. She was 82 years of age. Interment for father and mother was in the South Butler Savannah Cemetery, near Savannah, New York.

She was a member of the Oaklawn Baptist Church, past president of the Oaklawn Country Garden Club and of the Fortnights Club of Providence and was former director of choirs at the Rhode Island and Butler Hospitals.

She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Sarah Greene, of Warwick

and Mrs. Warren G. Baxter, of Cranston.

She will be buried in the Westcott family plot on the family estate, in Oaklawn, Rhode Island.

News Item: The death of Dr. George Dana Pickens, of Arcade occurred at the Chaffee Memorial Hospital, in Springville, New York, on Saturday, August 31, 1957, following an illness of short duration.

Dr. Pickens was born in Parish. New York, on June 20, 1883, the son of the late Charles and Emma Wescott Pickens. He was a graduate of University of Buffalo School of Dentistry and began his practice in Arcade in 1908.

A former president of the Arcade Board of Education, he had been a member of the board for 22 years. He was a Past Master and 50 year member of Arcade Lodge No. 419 F. and A. M.; a life member of Damascus Temple of Rochester; a member of the Buffalo Consistory; Past District Deputy Grand Master of Genesee - Wyoming District, a member of the Genesee - Wyoming Shrine Club and the Cattaraugus County Shrine Club.

He was also a member of the 8th District Dental Society, the American Dental Association and the Arcade Conservation Club, and a past member of the Arcade Men's Club and Lion Club.

(I forgot to mention he was a member and Past President of the

National Society of Stukely Westcott Descendants.)
He is survived by his wife Linda, two daughters, Mrs. Horace Kuhn, of Machias and Mrs. Lucius Hitchcock of Brockport; six grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Carrie Horning and Mrs. Clifford Cane-field of Parish and Mrs. Nellie Ellis of Chittenango, and two brothers, Arbie R. Pickens of Brewerton and Floyd Pickens of Parish, and another brother, The Reverend Charles Pickens of Oakfield, died several years ago.

Funeral services were from the Congregational Church and interment was in the Arcade Rural Cemetery.

Joseph R. Westcott, of 26 Front Street, Binghamton, a descendant of one of Binghamton's early families, died this morning October 7, 1957, at City Hospital where he had been a patient a short time. He was 75 years of age.

In early life an engineer and municipal surveyor, Mr. Westcott had engaged in the real estate business, since 1926. The family had extensive real estate holdings in the city, including the Westcott Block at 120-122 State Street.

The family home was at 174 Court Street (now site of the Sears Roebuck & Company store) where Mr. Westcott was born. His father, Frederick and grandfather, Harvey were cigar manufacturers prior to 1900. The family donated the courthouse clock to Broome County, New York State.

He was buried in Bainbridge Cemetery beside his wife, who was

the former Caroline Sands and who died in 1919.

Joseph Westcott is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Carl ton J. Cook, a member of our Society and one sister, Mrs. Joseph Martin, who sent this obituary notice and is also a Westcott Society member, both of Binghamton. Also survived by one niece, Mrs. Verner Utke-Ramsing, Junior, of Coronado, California, also a member of our society, one granddaughter, Miss Louise Cook and one grandson, Charles Cook.
