John Ward Westcott, died January 14, 1958. He was a brother of our dear member, Mrs. Etta Schumacher, of Ann Arbor, Michigan.

John Ward Westcott was known for his owning the only floating post office on the Detroit River, where his boats met the ships to deliver mail, laundry, coffee, engine room supplies and even passengers, without requiring the freighters to stop at the port.

John Ward was 74 years old and after suffering a stroke at his I home, in Redford Township, he died at the Mount Carmel Mercy Hospital. He had inherited the firm from his father, Captain J. W. Westcott, who died in 1914. He directed the business with his wife, Mildred and son, J. W. Westcott, Jr. A daughter, Mrs. Joseph Hogan and five grandchildren also survive.

Mrs. Dorothy Ellis Erlenback, wife of Dr. Roy Erlenback, of Chittenango, New York, died January 15, 1958, at her home. She was a member of our Society and niece of the late Dr. George Dana Pickens, our past president. Dorothy was a native of the town of Sullivan. Spaded all space in garden used for planting. Believe that exercise has given me improved appetite as I have done my own cooking.

The last publication of Westcott Quarterly was very interesting. But it was sad to note the names of those whom we will not see again.

He and Mildred are to be 1958 guests of honor, unless of course some bridge tournament interferes. So come and say "Hello" to the Westcotts on Sunday, June 8th, anytime from 2 P.M. until dark. Last June, Garden Editor, Cora Harris came all the way from North Carolina; Marguerite Palmer may be here from Texas, next June. I am always embarrassed when people come from a distance. Mine is still only a small backyard and I am too busy caring for other roses to do much for my own."

Dear Cousin Mary, I will be glad to give you and no doubt, many of our recent members, a little of our early Stukely Westcott data. Roscoe L. Whitman, the founder of our Society wrote an article on April 28, 1935, in which he said, quote: "It will be three centuries next Wednesday (May 1, 1935), since Westcott and William Arnold set sail with their families, from Dartmouth in Devonshire, England. Fifty-five days later, June 24th, 1635, their small sailing craft landed its venturesome and determined voyagers on the shores of Plymouth Bay, at Hingham. Westcott went immediately to Salem, Massachusetts and there became an avowed advocate of the doctrines and principles of Roger Williams."
