EARLY WESTCOTT FAMILY HISTORY---(Continued from the March Quarterly, 1958)
Roscoe Whitman wrote as of April 28, 1936;

"Westcott sought the shores of New England to free himself from the political, economic, and religious oppression that was stifling his native England. Leaving neighbors and relatives and the graves of his ancestors, he sailed for America, believing he could there realize and enjoy the liberty he was being denied. He hoped for a social order within which, consistent with the principle of the greatest good for the greatest number, he could give reign to his own initiative, develop his own individuality and live such a life as suited him.

## EARLY WESTCOTT FAMILY HISTORY---(Continued)

It was but natural then that upon reaching Salem, Massachusetts, he should become a member of the church of Roger Williams and share in the opinions held by his pastor. However, he was quickly to realize that in escaping the divine bishops of England it was only to fall prey of the "Divine Bretheren" of the young colony. He had cast his lot in the New World; he would not turn back. Every fragment of records of him plainly indicates that he was a God-fearing man, giving credence to the faith that God created all men equal. Like his pastor, in October, 1635, he received the "Great Censure" because of his views and was ordered to remove himself and his family from the jurisdiction of the General Court of the Massachusetts Bay Colony. This he did in March, 1638.
