EARLY WESTCOTT HISTORY --- (Continued From June Issue)

"He (Stukely) joined his pastor in the Providence Plantations and in the same year (1638) was received by Roger Williams as one of the original proprietors, his name appearing first on the list, and in that year, with Williams and ten others, he again affirmed his christian faith by helping to organize the First Baptist Church in America, the present old First Baptist Church of Providence; Likewise soon after he removed from Providence to "Old Warwick", he joined (1647) with his old friend William Arnold and ten others, in uniting in church relations and agreed to support the faith and practice the principles of Christ's doctrine, retaining his membership in the church at Providence where he attended services whenever possible."

DOCTOR'S DECREE--- An article, from Charles J. Westcott, of Dunmore, Pennsylvania, Society Director, about his son Malcolm R. Westcott who is also a member of our Westcott clan: "On June 21, 1958, Malcolm R. Westcott of 37 Leslie Road, Belmont, Massachusetts, received his degree of Doctor of Philosophy in clinical psychology, at Harvard University.

Graduated from Central High School, Dunmore, Pennsylvania in 1946 as class president, a member of the National Honorary Society. He entered Syracuse University as a holder of a Scranton Alumni Club Scholarship and while there was elected to membership in Psy Chi; the National Honorary Society of Psychologists, and the Phi Delta Theta Fraternity. In 1950 he received his Bachelor of Arts degree and in 1951 he received a degree of Master of Science from Pennsylvania State University.

For his Doctorate at Harvard he wrote a thesis on "Certain Characteristics of Anxiety". He has been appointed professor in the department of psychology at Vassar College, Poughkeepsie, New York

His wife is the former, Maureen Page, of East Orange, New Jersey. They have one son, Terrence, two years old."
