"This year marks the 85th, that a Westcott boat has been serving the vessels of the Great Lakes along the Detroit waterfront and it is the busiest. Ever since old Captain J. W. Westcott climbed down out of the pilot house of the Mineral Rock to start his service with a rowboat, Westcotts have been delivering supplies, messages, crew members and every other conceivable item to and from the big boats in midstream with nary a pause.

Of late years the powerful little J. W. Westcott II also has been handling mail for the Detroit River Station of the Post-Office.

This makes the 44 foot craft a welcome sight to sailors.

Last year, the J. W. Westcott II made deliveries at a rate of 73 boats a day. One peak day, it serviced 145 boats.

The J. W. Westcott II and the company's standby boat, the J. W. Westcott, are powered by six-cylinder G. M. Diesels. Snugging them to the side of a giant freighter, is a real test of seamanship."
