Mr. James Samuel Neill (an addition to September Quarterly obituary) was the son of William and Dora (McHose) Neill, of Seattle, Washington. He was born on September 6, 1892 in Missoula, Montana. He died suddenly on May 22, 1962, in New York City. He is buried in Kensico Cemetery, at Valhalla, New York.

A veteran of World War I, Mr. Neill had a long career as an actor, playing in Robert Mantel's Shakespeare Company, the "Pilgrimage Play", at Chicago Civic Shakespeare Theatre, with Fritz Leiber and many others. During World War II, he took up milling machine parts in New York City, Oshkosh, Wisconsin, Seattle, Washington,

and Santa Monica, California.

He married Harriet L. Babcock, on August 23, 1928. Surviving beside his wife, are one daughter, Louise Wescott Neill, New York City, one brother, Frank W. Neill, of Los Angeles, California and two sisters , Mrs. Nellie Hilton, of Seattle, Washington, and Mrs. George Sternberg, of Anchorage, Alaska.

ANNUAL ROSE DAY --- Attracts 300 at Crugers Community.

"An annual gardening event dating back to the early war years has been transplanted from Glenridge, New Jersey to the new retire-

ment community in Crugers, called Springvale-on-the-Hudson.

The event, which continues to flourish, is an annual Rose Day given by Dr. Cynthia Westcott, author and lecturer on gardening who sold her New Jersey home last Fall and moved to Westchester. She discovered that the 40 acre site overlooking the Hudson River, provides plenty of room for planting, and she has been named Chairman of the Springvale Gardening Club by its 76 members.

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This year, Dr. Westcott held her 22nd annual Rose Day and entertained some 300 guests at tea on the lawn. The annual menu was unchanged, and included 1,500 cookies baked by Dr. Cynthia Westcott who provided the recipes for all readers in her autobiography,

"Plant Doctoring is Fun."

Friends throughout the metropolitan area attended as did the Croton Garden Club and the Richmond County Garden Club from Staten Island. The day concluded with a buffet supper for 100 guests prepared by Dr. Cynthia Westcott."

EUROPE BOUND --- Cousin Harriet Neill packed up and set sail for England on September 5th on the S. S. Queen Mary. Her itinerary was made up by the Travel Service and she planned on visiting many points of interest, one of which was the St. Leger Flat Race, in Doncaster, Yorkshire. It is the oldest horse race in the world, for a money purse, being established in 1776.

Harriet had a grand time and changed towns and hotels every few days. "The hotels were all interesting and comfortable--meals excellent. People most kind. Took side trips by bus or train. I

loved Bideford especially -- enjoyed the buckwheat cakes."

Harriet didn't get any leads on our Westcott history but found a Genealogist in Devon who had books on Granvilles--and visited an old church of St. Mary, in Bideford where Granvilles(1659?) are buried and commemorated, also "Westacotts" (1800's). The Bridge in the town was build about 1400. The Granvilles, Stuckleys, West-cotts and St. Legers all had a hand in it. The bridge has been reconstructed since then.
