Ellicott township: (1) David Wescott, 25, farmer, b. N.Y.; Leonora, 23, b. N.Y.; Lucy, 2, b. N.Y.; Mary Oswato (not clear), 16, b. N.Y. (2) Samuel Wescott, 30, grocer, b. N.Y. and shown as living at a hotel in Ellicott.
