NATIONAL SOCIETY NEWS

We have changed our "official" motel from the Holiday Inn near South Attleboro to the less expensive Hi-View Motel on Route 146, about 2 miles south of Woonsocket, R.I., and about 6 miles north of Providenne. In 1960 quite a few of the Cousins stayed there, but had difficulty getting breakfast, as the Howard Johnson restaurant (the nearest eating-place - about a mile away) did not open then until 10 A.M. However, Cousin Susan Handy has visited the Hi-View recently, has found that they have added a new section of rooms, and says that now "it is really very nice at a little over half the price" of the Holiday Inn! She has also checked the Howard Johnson restaurant and has learned that they now serve breakfast as early as 8 A.M. every day, including Sundays.

Cousins preferring to stay at the Hi-View Motel and coming from the West would come on Route 95 until they enter Route 146 in Providence. The Hi-View is on Route 146. Rates are: 1 person room \$8

The address is: Hi-View Motel, Inc., R.F.D. 2, Eddie Dowling Highway, Woonsocket, R.I. 02895. Reservations should be made direct to the motel. They ask for a deposit of the price plus tax for one night along with the reservation.

She says that if there are not too many, they can camp on her land. This was announced in the Spring Quarterly and still stands. For trailers there is also a small trailer park in Pawtucket, R.I. It is for recreational vehicles and has electrical and water hookups.

Registration on Friday evening, August 16 will now be at Cousin Susan Handy's home on Route 126 (not at the Holiday Inn), 7-9 P.M. Slides of former gatherings will be shown.

Saturday morning, August 17, we shall meet at the Old Slater Mill Museum, Roosevelt Ave., Pawtucket, R.I. for further registration, the Business Meeting, Memorial Service, and showing of a film on the life of Samuel Slater, who started the first Cotton Mill in this country. Luncheon will be served at the Mill by the R.I. Chapter.

This Mill Museum is now a National Historical Shrine. On the way back to "The Breezes" (the home of Cousin Susan Westcott Handy, where the clambake will be held at 5:30), we shall stop at an old Quaker Meeting House and an early Colonial home - the Eleazer Arnold House in Saylesville.

DEATH

Walter Huntington Parker, aged 83, our member, died Jan. 22, 1968, at his home in Phoenix, Arizona, of which he had been a resident since 1953. He was born Aug. 1, 1884, in Stillwater, Minn., son of Reuben S. and Jennie Annette (Huntington) Parker. He received his master's degree in engineering from the University of Minnesota in 1907. He was a World War I veteran, and was a Major in the famed "Fighting 69th" Division. In 1919 he joined the University of Minnesota Mining School faculty, and in 1923 became head of the department - a position which he held until 1949, when he became Professor of Mining Emeritus. On August 16, 1921, he married Miss Veola Elizabeth Fourrell. He was President and Chief Engineer of San Juan Mining and Exploration Co., Minn., and was associated with several other mining enterprises as an engineering executive and consulting engineer. He was Editor of the School of Mines Blue Book for 34 years until his retirement in 1950. He was also a member of a long list of military, patriotic, mining and engineering, historical, and family societies. He is survived by his wife, to whom we send our singerest sympathy. He will be greatly missed.
