After dinner they will join the other Cousins for the evening of Registration and Reception, greeting well-known Cousins and meeting new Cousins. The official Scrapbooks will be on display, coat-of-arms notepaper will be on sale, and a projector will be available in case anyone wants to show slides.

Instead of a Saturday banquet, we plan to have a smorgasbord. Please send your smorgasbord reservations plus check in full payment by May 25 to: Mrs. Pauline V. Clark, 71 Downer St., Baldwinsville, N.Y. 13027. The cost of the smorgasbord will be: adults - \$3.50, children - \$2.50, plus 6% tax on the total, plus 15% of the total food cost (before tax) for the "gratuity". For example, a couple with 2 children would pay \$7 for parents plus \$5 for children, or \$12 for actual food. The tax (6%x\$12) would be \$,72. The gratuity would be 15%x\$12, or \$1.80. Thus their check would be for \$12.72 plus \$1.80, or \$14.52 total. Cousin Pauline Clark must order that smorgasbord before, June 1 (one month in Advance), so please, as mails so often is slow, get off your reservations (showing number of adults and of children) plus checks in full, in time to reach her by May 25 if possible. This would allow time for possible delays.

On Sunday, August 2, we shall attend Church together. After the service there will be the opportunity to inspect Westcott graves in the cemetery.

Final details, including full Friday evening, Saturday, and Sunday programs, will be in the next (early July) Quarterly.

Mrs. Ruth Marian (Westcott) Johnson, aged 83, our member, wife of Aaron Guy Johnson, died Jan. 28, 1970 at the Hermitage Methodist Home in Alexandria, Va., where she had lived with her husband since June, 1969. Previously they had lived since 1922 in Washington, D.C. She was born Nov. 3, 1886 in Goodwin, South Dakota, daughter of the late Chester Rockwell and Rosalia (Felt) Westcott. She graduated in 1907 from South Dakota State College, where in 1908 and 1909-10 she was an assistant in the Music Department. In 1908-9 she attended the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago, where she won gold medals in piano and musical composition. After her marriage, Aug. 30, 1911, to Aaron Guy Johnson, also of the Class of 1907 at South Dakota State College, they lived in Madison, Wisconsin until 1922, when they moved to Washington, D.C. Besides her husband, she is survived by a daughter, two sons, and five grandchildren. We offer our deepest sympathy to all of them.

Mrs. Lena L. (Kibby) Munson, aged 98, of Canandaigua, N.Y., who has been for some years our oldest living member, died March 4, 1970 after a brief illness. Of late years he did much historical research on the Evans-Derby area. Funeral services were held March 12 in Eden, N.Y., with burial in the North Evans Cemetery. He is survived by 3 sons: Raymond S. Hazard of Derby, Richard A. Hazard of North Evans, and Charles B. Hazard of Florida; a daughter, Mrs. Whitney Frost of North Evans; 12 grandchildren, and 19 great-grandchildren. He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. Walter Wilhelm of Jamestown, N.Y. We offer all of them our deepest sympathy.
