

The HOTEL ESCONDIDO is easy to reach From San Diego. travel north on Highway 163 until you merge with 1-15. Continue north on I-15 to Escondido. Exit on Centre City Parkway. Follow Centre City Parkway north to the first stop light (Citracado).

Southbound travelers on Interstate 15 should take the Felicita exit. Turn left at the end of the off-ramp. No other turns required: You are now on Gamble, which becomes Citracado once you pass under I-15. Continue on Citracado over the hill to the HOTEL ESCONDIDO.

When you callyour travel agent

Be sure to ask about including limousine service to Escondido. The phone for one used by the hotel is 743-2002, out of the airport.

Make your reservations now, as many reduced fares depend on early booking. Also ask about senior citizen discount, late night flight discount, any discount you can think of. It seems one must continue to ask questions, the airline agents do not offer best prices unless you ask and ask. All major airlines fly into San Diego and Los Angeles. Fly to California ahead of the reunion, stay later- it's cheaper.

Early Gatherings

The first family reunion of which there is record, was held in 1866 on the old farm homestead of Asa Stone in Coventry township, R. I., although it is said that reunions were held regularly previous to that year by the family descending from Oliver Westcott, who about the year 1800, settled on a farm tract at West Eaton, Madison County, N. Y. It may be presumed that there were other gatherings even of an earlier period, but none are of record. As Stone was the youngest child of William and Lydia (Westcott) Stone. The exercises held on the Stone farm were opened with reading from the Bible of the first Stukely Westcott, which he brought with him from England and had been handed down in that branch of the family.

It is of record that, in 1878, over 250 descendants of Oliver Westcott, to whom reference has already been made, assembled on his old farm. In more recent years, this branch of the family has had its reunion each year. About 1857, descendants of William Westcott of Clarendon, Vt., and Savannah, N. Y., migrated to near Bangor, VanBuren County, Mich., and, since 1905, members of his posterity have had annual reunions. In the years of the 1860s and 1870s and the last in 1882, within the memory of this compiler, the Westcotts of Milford tp., Otsego County, N. Y., were accustomed to assemble each year, holding their reunions at different convenient places in or adjacent to the township.

A Wish That Culminated into a National Society

In 1930, Minnie Westcott Lunn (Mrs. Joseph Seth Lunn) of Oneonta, N. Y., expressed the wish that the Westcotts might have another reunion such as those she attended in Milford township, N. Y., when she was a child. She referred especially to the one in 1882 held on the old farm of her grandfather, Reuben Westcott. Her wish led to a reunion at Milford Center in 1931 at which 179 were present. At that time, the Stukely Westcott Descendants' Association of Milford tp., N. Y., was formed. (This Stukely Westcott [W. G., pp. 39-235] refers to a great-great-grandson of the first of the name, who lived in Cheshire. Mass., and was the father of the three brothers who early settled in Milford tp.) The late Brig.-Gen. James Westcott Lester of Saratoga Springs, N. Y. (W. G., p. 264-5), was the first president of this association. He died in office and was succeeded by Harris Lee Cooke, esquire, of Cooperstown, N. Y. (W. G., p. 266.)

This association has carried on a splendid work by creating an endowment fund for the perpetual care of the old part of the cemetery at Milford Center, where the pioneers of the family in the township—Benjamin, James and Reuben and their sister Dorcas (Fitch) are buried.

Another reunion of this association was held at Oneonta, N. Y., in 1933, when 140 were present, including a number descending from other branches of the family, among them Dr. and Mrs. Allan F. Westcott of Annapolis, Md., Mr. and Mrs. Haydn B. Westcott of Ridgefield Park, N. J., William Mar Westcott of Apponaug, R. I., and William C. Driver of New Rochelle, N. Y. At this gathering, interest was manifested in the organization of a National society of Westcott descendants, and later, Harris Lee Cooke, esquire, then president of the Milford association, appointed a committee to have the matter in charge and arrange for an organization dinner-meeting in New York City. This meeting was held on the following January 13, 1934, the 257th anniversary of the death of Stukely Westcott.

In the Fall of 1933, members of the family living in Rhode Island assembled and under the leadership of V. Stukely Westcott of Pawtucket, organized and arranged to have representatives at the dinnermeeting in New York the following January.

The Dinner-Meeting and Organization

One hundred and nineteen descendants had each pledged one dollar to help defray the expenses of organizing and they became the charter members of the Society. Forty were present at the meeting, which was held in the Hotel Lexington in New York.

Dr. Allan F. Westcott, who was chairman of the committee on organization, presided and with him at the head-table, besides Mrs. Westcott, were Dr. and Mrs. Niles Westcott and Mr. and Mrs. Roscoe L. Whitman. At the other tables were Mr. and Mrs. V. Stukely Westcott, Mr. and Mrs. Frank L. Hadley, Miss Edith S. Arnold, Mrs. Jennie C. Noxon, Edmund Whitman Morris, Dr. and Mrs. Frederic P. Solley, Mrs. John Klein, Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Westcott, Carlton L. Wastcoat, Mrs. Adelbert Niles (Morris) Potter, William Dyer Merriam, Mr. and Mrs. Wade Martin, Mr. and Mrs. Willard Henry Frost, Mr. and Mrs. Coulman C. Westcott, *Mrs. Caroline W. Woodburn, Mrs. Lulu W. Iseman, Mr. and Mrs. *Haydn B. Westcott, the Misses Ethel G. and Florence E. Clarke, Miss Gwendolyn W. Jones, Mrs. Samuel Driver and William Mar Westcott.

Dr. Allan F. Westcott was made permanent chairman and Miss Florence Earll Clarke, secretary.

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The 300th Anniversary Celebration in 1935 of the Coming to America of the Family Founder

Arrangements for the Tercentenary Celebration in 1935 were made by the following committee: V. Stukely Westcott, Chairman; Dr. Allan Ferguson Westcott, Dr. Frank Howard Westcott, Dr. Niles Westcott, Coulman C. Westcott, Leslie P. Westcott, Harris Lee Cooke and Roscoe L. Whitman.

This Celebration resulted in an outstanding demonstration of family spirit, of love a posterity may bear an ancestor after an elapse of three centuries, of appreciation and of recognition of the deeds of forebears who sought and helped win liberty of action and conscience, and who helped create a civilization more dynamic, more far-reaching, more enduring, than the world has ever known.

Chapters of the Society

Charters were granted by the Society for the following Chapter Milford Tp., N. Y., Chapter, No. 1, Feb. 9, 1934; Rhode Island Chapt No. 2, Mar. 9, 1934; Greater New York Chapter, No. 3, Dec. 8, 195 Northern New York Chapter, No. 4, Sept. 6, 1935; and Vermont Chater, No. 5, Oct. 27, 1937.

Through the efforts of Miss Rachel C. Wilkins, descendants of Nicholas Westcott, a pioneer in Clarendon tp., Rutland County, Vt., who reside in and adjacent to Vermont, an association was formed at Lake St. Catherine in that State in September, 1936. It received its charter for a Chapter in the following November, and in 1937, H. Phillip Westcott was made President; Leon D. Baker, Vice-President; Miss Rachel C. Wilkins, Historian; Frank N. Baker, Secretary; Nathan H. Wilkins, Treasurer. This Chapter has placed headstones at the graves of Nicholas Westcott, Jr., and his wife, Phebe Hines, thus again demonstrating one of the purposes of family organization.
