The Great American Desert: An Interview with Lou Wescott Beck

The following material was adapted by our Society historian, Betty W. Acker, from an article which originally appeared in the April 12, 1916 issue of "The Outlook".

During the past year reports have come to us from visitors to California of the remarkable life-saving work carried on in the desert regions of the southwest by a former mining prospector, Mr. Lou Wescott Beck, and his dog.

Mr. Beck lived in Pasadena, Calif. and when he was not occupied with his rescue work on the desert he gave what are known as "grubstake lectures" in the mining regions.

Few people in the United States have any idea of the real American desert, which extends east and west from Salt Lake to the Sierra range and north and south from northern Nevada to the Mexican line. This



area contains something over two hundred thousand square miles. In spite of its death-like aridness, this region is of great economic value because of its mineral resources and the presence of alkalis, which include potash, gypsum and soda.

His companion for ten years on the desert trips was his dog "Rufus". Rufus wore elkskin shoes to protect his feet from the hot sand. Rufus has a record of having saved thirty-two lives of men in the desert. Lou Beck has the record of having saved three hundred and thirty-four lives who were in the last stages of desert delirium. He said that Rufus was an expert in testing whether water was drinkable.

Rufus also carried an antidote for snakebites. They saved the lives of several Indians who had been bitten by the horned rattlesnake. Indians were more likely to be bitten as they went barefoot.

Rufus was a cross between a St. Bernard and a Siberian bloodhound. Lou Wescott Beck

died in 1917 and it about broke the heart of Rufus.

There is information indicating that Mary Hill retold the Lou Wescott Beck story in "The Child's Treasury". Perhaps one of the Society's members could locate this story.

The following obituary appeared in The Rutland Herald on March 26, 2005.

East Poultney- Mabel L. Wescott, age 98, passed away on March 25,2005, at her residence in East Poultney with her family by her side.

Mabel was born on April 7, 1906, in Wells, VT, daughter of the late Charles and Bertha (Juckett) Lake. She boarded at the Troy Conference Academy for two years and graduated in 1923. Mabel was

a graduate of Castleton State Teachers College and earned a masters degree in Education and a certificate of Advanced

Graduate Study from the University of Hartford, CT. Mabel married Phil Wescott in the East Poultney Baptist Church Parsonage on July 22, 1928. Mr. and Mrs. Wescott resided in East Poultney for many years. Mabel was employed as an

elementary school teacher in Connecticut, Poultney, and surrounding towns.

She was a very active member for many years of the Untied Baptist Church of East Poultney. Mabel was a leader of the Deep Rocks Boys 4H Club. She also worked as a volunteer at the Poultney Young at Heart Club where she was a Bingo Caller, exercise leader, and Meals on Wheels delivery person. Mabel was a lifetime member and past president of the Rutland County Retired Teachers Association. She was also a member of Valley Grange and a member of the Tunix Grange in Bloomfield, CT. Mabel was a member of the Poultney and the Middletown Springs Historical Society. She was a past president of the Society of Stukely Westcott Descendents of America.

Mabel is survived by one son, Charles Willard Wescott of Rutland; four daughters, Wilma W. Avery of New Jersey, Pauline Dennis Schumann of Sheffield, MA, Phyllis A. Reed of Wells, VT and Velma J. Reed of East Poultney; 16 grandchildren; 33 greatgrandchildren; 16 great-grandchildren; and many nieces and nephews. She was

predeceased by her husband, H. Phillips Wescott in 1959; two brothers, Robert Lake and William Lake; two grandsons, Phillip James Reed and Keith Allen Reed.
