though it will be in July there is always breeze blowing which makes it most comfortable. More information will follow as arrangements are made.



George Roessing Hays - Life Member Profile

George Roessing (Ross) Hays was born on January 27, 1912 in Arnoldsburg, West Virginia. Arnoldsburg is a small town in Calhoun County about 50 miles southeast of Parkersburg and is located on the West Fork of the Little Kanawha River.

The "Blue Hole" on the Lower West Fork was a deep swimming hole that was always described as bottomless. Large catfish used to swim in the Blue Hole where local boys would jump in and wrestle the catfish (a fishing sport now commonly called "noodling").

Ross and his brother Bernard were raised there by his mother, Myrtle Reading Hays, and his father, George Warren Hays Jr. After his education years he taught school in a one-room schoolhouse. Ross later became the President of First Federation life Insurance Company, doing business in the Caribbean. Later on he worked in the wholesale lumber business in Tampa, Florida, where he has resided for the last 50+ years. Ross served in World War II as a Chemical Warfare Officer in the United States Army Air Corps.

Ross is descended from Stukely Westcott via his grandmother, Mary Westcott Roessing, and great-grandmother, Julia Ann Westcott, the 5th great-granddaughter of Stukely. As a youngster, Ross heard about the Westcotts from his father. However, he only recently found out that his namesake uncle, Frank M. Roessing, was a contributor when Roscoe Whitman was composing his Westcott book, in which Frank is recognized by Whitman in the forward section of Vol. 1. Ross is now a life member of SSWDA, # 1062, having been enrolled by his daughter, Barbara Hays Henderson.

Cemetery Research Project open to all Society Members

You do not need to know the ancestry of these people. This will be one way that the many people listed in Roscoe Whitman's Genealogies as "Went West" might be located by their descendants.

The "Cemetery Research Project" page on the sswda.org website will be indexed for ease of use in locating your lost ancestor/s. Please feel free to submit as many grave sites as you can or at least the most obvious ones. It would also be helpful if you would include the name and address of the cemetery if it is available.
